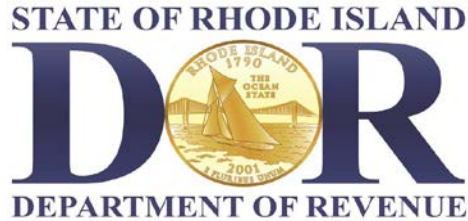

State of Rhode Island Monthly State Hotel Tax Report
FY 2016 State 5.0 Percent Hotel Tax Allocation June 2016

In June 2012, the Rhode Island Department of Revenue began issuing a report on the allocation of the state 5.0 percent hotel tax as required by Rhode Island General Laws §§ 42-63.1-3 and 42-63.1-12. The report is meant to be descriptive and does not purport to project or assess the collection of the state 5.0 percent hotel tax. The report provides information on the year-over-year and fiscal year-to-date allocation of the revenues collected for the state 5.0 percent hotel tax. It should be noted that early payments, late payments and adjustments may be included in this report.

Expansion of the State 5.0 Percent Hotel Tax Base

Effective July 1, 2015, the reselling of lodging by online travel companies and the unlicensed rental of accommodations via internet platforms and other media became subject to the state 5.0 percent hotel tax. In April 2016, the Division of Taxation distributed state hotel taxes that were generated from these rentals to all municipalities other than the City of Newport. The revenues received and distributed were for taxable rental activity that occurred between July 1, 2015 and December 31, 2015 inclusive. In June 2016, the Division of Taxation distributed state hotel taxes that were generated from these rentals to all municipalities other than the City of Newport for taxable rental activity that occurred between January 1, 2016 and June 30, 2016 inclusive. These figures are included in the analysis of fiscal year-to-date over fiscal year-to-date collections for municipalities other than the City of Newport.

The City of Newport has been distributing state hotel tax revenues from these rentals monthly since August 2015. The revenues distributed by the City of Newport for these rentals are included in the year-over-year and fiscal year-to-date figures.

The Office of Revenue Analysis has included additional tables in this report that break out by municipality the revenues received from room resellers and hosting platforms that were subsequently distributed by the Division of Taxation and the City of Newport.

New State Hotel Tax Distribution Effective for Tax Returns and Payments Received After December 31, 2015 and before July 1, 2016

According to Rhode Island General Law Section 42-63.1-3(b) titled “Tourism and Development – Distribution of tax” for returns and payments received after December 31, 2015 and before July 1, 2016, the distribution of state hotel tax revenues was changed from that which existed for payments and returns received prior to January 1, 2016. For returns and payments received after June 30, 2016 and before July 1, 2017, the distribution of the state hotel tax revenues returns to the allocation percentages in effect prior to January 1, 2016, except for receipts from the Omni Providence Hotel. Revenues received from the Omni Providence Hotel continue to be distributed based on allocation percentages in effect after December 31, 2015. The distribution of state hotel tax revenues for the respective time periods is as follows:

The fiscal year-to-date dollar figures contained in this report on a going forward basis will reflect a combination of the state hotel tax distribution percentages that were in effect prior to January 1, 2016, after December 31, 2015 and prior to July 1, 2016, and after June 30, 2016. The year-over-year dollar figures contained in the report will reflect the distribution of receipts for “Prior to Jan 1, 2016” for July 2015 through November 2015 and all of FY 2015; for December through May of FY 2016, the year-over-year dollar figures will reflect the distribution of receipts for “After Dec 31, 2015 and Prior to Jul 1, 2016”; and for June 2016 the year-over-year dollar figures will reflect the distribution of receipts for “After Jun 30, 2016”. The state hotel tax revenues from the Omni Providence Hotel generated by rental activity in June 2016 were paid early and accounted for in

May 2016 state hotel tax collections and thus, are not included in the year-over-year figures but are included in the fiscal year-to-date over fiscal year-to-date values.

Summary of the State 5.0 Percent Hotel Tax Allocation

Analysis of Year-over-Year Allocation for June:

The following table is a summary of the year-over-year allocation of revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax.

- Total revenues received from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax for June 2016 were \$2.05 million, an increase of \$86,117 or 4.4 percent from the \$1.97 million received for June 2015. The largest share of these revenues is distributed to the State's eight regional tourism districts.
- Regional tourism districts received \$859,583 of the total revenues collected from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax for June 2016, an increase of \$40,411 or 4.9 percent over the \$819,172 received for June 2015.
 - Tourism districts other than the Convention Authority of Providence and the Warwick Department of Economic Development received 47 percent of the state hotel taxes generated from hotels located in the district for both June 2016 and June 2015.
 - The Convention Authority of Providence and the Warwick Department of Economic Development received 31 percent of the state hotel taxes generated from hotels located in Providence and Warwick for June 2016, except from the Omni Providence Hotel, and for June 2015. The Omni Providence Hotel made an early payment for hotel tax generated by rental activity in June 2016. These receipts were accounted for in the May 2016 hotel tax collections.
 - The Aquidneck Island tourism district received \$9,166 in June 2016 from room resellers and hosting platforms as a result of the expansion of the state hotel tax base.
- For June 2016, the State's cities and towns received \$513,655, an increase of \$47,681 or 10.2 percent over the \$465,974 received for June 2015.
 - Municipalities received 25 percent of the state hotel tax revenues generated from hotels located in the city or town for both June 2016 and June 2015. Providence receives the same allocation from all of the hotels located in the city, except from

the Omni Providence Hotel where it receives none of the state hotel tax revenues generated.

- The City of Newport received \$4,875 in June 2016 from room resellers and hosting platforms as a result of the expansion of the state hotel tax base.
- For June 2016, the Rhode Island Convention Center Authority (RICCA) received none of the state 5.0 percent hotel tax revenues generated by the Omni Providence Hotel. RICCA was allocated 30 percent of these revenues received for June 2015. As a result, RICCA's share of state 5.0 percent hotel tax revenues received for June 2016 was \$31,382 or 100 percent less than for June 2015.
- For June 2016, the Rhode Island Commerce Corporation (RICC) received \$431,470 from state 5.0 percent hotel tax revenues, an increase of \$11,808 or 2.8 percent over the \$419,662 received for June 2015 that was deposited as general revenues. Effective July 1, 2015, RICC began to receive a share of the revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax. Before July 1, 2015, RICC's share of state hotel tax revenues was deposited as general revenues.
 - For June 2016, RICC's share of the revenues from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax is 21 percent from all hotels, except from the Omni Providence Hotel. The Omni Providence Hotel made an early payment for hotel tax generated by rental activity in June 2016. These receipts were accounted for in the May 2016 hotel tax collections.
 - For June 2015, the portion of state hotel tax revenues deposited as general revenues was 21 percent from all hotels located in the state, except from the Omni Providence Hotel where it was 27 percent.
 - RICC received \$4,095 in June 2016 from room resellers and hosting platforms as a result of the expansion of the state hotel tax base.
- For June 2016, the Providence Warwick Convention & Visitors Bureau (PWCVB) received \$249,912 in state hotel tax revenues, an increase of \$17,599 or 7.6 percent from the \$232,313 received for June 2015.
 - For both June 2016 and June 2015, PWCVB received 23 percent of the state hotel tax revenues generated from hotels located in Providence and Warwick, except from the Omni Providence Hotel, and seven percent of the state hotel tax revenues generated from all other hotels located in the state.
 - For June 2016, the Omni Providence Hotel made an early payment for state hotel tax revenues that was accounted for in the May 2016 hotel tax collections. For June 2015, PWCVB received 12 percent of the state hotel tax revenues generated from the Omni Providence Hotel.
 - PWCVB received \$1,365 in June 2016 from room resellers and hosting platforms as a result of the expansion of the state hotel tax base.

Analysis of Fiscal Year-to-Date through June:

The following table is a summary of the fiscal year-to-date allocation of revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax.

- Total revenues received from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax for FY 2016 through June were \$19.37 million, an increase of \$2.15 million or 12.5 percent over the \$17.22 million received for FY 2015 through June. The largest share of these revenues is distributed to the State's eight regional tourism districts.
- For FY 2016 through June, the regional tourism districts received \$7.63 million of the total revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax, an increase of \$637,230 or 9.1 percent over the \$6.99 million received in the same period last fiscal year.
 - For June 2016, the shares of the state hotel tax revenues received by the regional tourism districts returned to those in effect for rental activity prior to December 2015, except from the Omni Providence Hotel. The Omni Providence Hotel made an early payment for hotel tax generated by rental activity in June 2016. The share received by the Convention Authority of Providence was distributed with the May 2016 hotel tax collections.
 - For December through May of FY 2016, the regional tourism districts received 42 percent of the state hotel tax revenues generated in the tourism district. In the case of the Convention Authority of Providence and the Warwick Department of Economic Development, the comparable figure is 28 percent for hotels located in Providence and Warwick.
 - For July through November 2015 of FY 2016 and FY 2015 through June, these shares were 47 percent and 31 percent, respectively.
 - The regional tourism districts received \$124,528 in year-to-date FY 2016 through June from room resellers and hosting platforms as a result of the expansion of the state hotel tax base.
- For FY 2016 through June, the State's cities and towns were distributed \$4.56 million, an increase of \$515,917 or 12.8 percent over the \$4.04 million received for FY 2015 through June.
 - Municipalities received 25 percent of the state hotel tax revenues generated from hotels located in the city or town for both FY 2016 through June and FY 2015 through June. Providence receives the same allocation from all of the hotels located in the city, except from the Omni Providence Hotel where it receives none of the state hotel tax revenues generated.
 - Municipalities received \$78,548 in year-to-date FY 2016 through June from room resellers and hosting platforms as a result of the expansion of the state hotel tax base.

- For FY 2016 through June, the Rhode Island Convention Center Authority (RICCA) received \$165,897, a decrease of \$152,118 or -47.8 percent from the \$318,016 received for FY 2015 through June.
 - For December through June of FY 2016, RICCA received no share of the state 5.0 percent hotel tax revenues generated at the Omni Providence Hotel.
 - For July through November of FY 2016 and FY 2015 through June, RICCA's share of state hotel tax revenues produced by the Omni Providence Hotel was 30 percent.
- For FY 2016 through June, the Rhode Island Commerce Corporation (RICC) received \$4.64 million of state 5.0 percent hotel tax revenues, an increase of \$961,755 or 26.1 percent over the \$3.68 million received for FY 2015 through June that was deposited as general revenues.
 - For June 2016, the share of the state hotel tax revenues received by the RICC returned to the percentages in effect for rental activity prior to December 2015, except from the Omni Providence Hotel. The Omni Providence Hotel made an early payment for hotel tax generated by rental activity in June 2016. The share received by the RICC was distributed with the May 2016 hotel tax collections.
 - For December through May of FY 2016, RICC's share of the revenues generated by the state hotel tax was 28 percent from hotels located outside of Providence and Warwick, 24 percent from hotels located in Providence and Warwick, except the Omni Providence Hotel, where it was 60 percent.
 - From July through November of FY 2016, RICC's share of the revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax was 21 percent from all hotels located in the state except from the Omni Providence Hotel, where it was 27 percent. For FY 2015 through June, the same percentages applied except that state hotel tax revenues were deposited in the general fund.
 - RICC received \$72,945 in year-to-date FY 2016 through June from room resellers and hosting platforms as a result of the expansion of the state hotel tax base.
- For FY 2016 through June, the Providence Warwick Convention & Visitors Bureau (PWCVB) received \$2.38 million, an increase of \$187,287 or 8.6 percent over the \$2.19 million received for FY 2015 through June.
 - For July 2016, the share of the state hotel tax revenues received by the PWCVB returned to the percentages in effect for rental activity prior to December 2015, except from the Omni Providence Hotel. The Omni Providence Hotel made an early payment for hotel tax generated by rental activity in June 2016. The share received by the PWCVB was distributed with the May 2016 hotel tax collections.
 - For December through May of FY 2016, PWCVB received 23 percent of the state hotel tax revenues produced by hotels located in Providence and Warwick other than the Omni Providence Hotel, 12 percent of the state hotel tax revenues generated from the Omni Providence Hotel and five percent of the state hotel tax revenues produced by all other hotels located in the state.
 - For both July through November of FY 2016 and July 2014 through May 2015 of FY 2015, PWCVB received the same percentage of state hotel tax revenues from hotels located in Providence and Warwick and the Omni Providence Hotel as above

but received seven percent of the state hotel tax revenues produced by all other hotels located in the state.

- PWCVB received \$38,170 in year-to-date FY 2016 through June from room resellers and hosting platforms as a result of the expansion of the state hotel tax base.

Detail of the State 5.0 Percent Hotel Tax Allocation

Analysis of Year-over-Year Allocation for June:

The table *Detail of Rhode Island State 5.0% Hotel Tax Allocation: Year-over-Year Collections* provides a breakdown of the distribution of the revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax on a year-over-year basis. The State's eight regional tourism districts include: (1) Aquidneck Island Tourism District¹; (2) Block Island; (3) the Convention Authority of the City of Providence; (4) East Providence²; (5) Northern Rhode Island Tourism District³; (6) South County Tourism District⁴; (7) the Statewide Tourism District⁵; and (8) the Warwick Department of Economic Development. The regional tourism districts are administered by either a regional council, a municipal government entity, or, as in the case of the Statewide Tourism District, the Rhode Island Commerce Corporation.

For June 2016, the largest recipients of the tourism districts' share of state 5.0 percent hotel tax revenues were:

The three regional tourism districts with the largest nominal decreases in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax for June 2016 versus June 2015 were:

- Block Island: \$(12,071)
- Convention Authority of Providence: \$(10,898)
- Northern Rhode Island: \$(10,323)

The three regional tourism districts with the largest percentage increases in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax for June 2016 versus June 2015 were:

- East Providence: 35.7 percent
- South County: 30.2 percent
- Statewide: 25.9 percent

The three regional tourism districts with the largest percentage decreases in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax for June 2016 versus June 2015 were:

- Block Island: -27.8 percent
- Northern Rhode Island: -26.3 percent
- Convention Authority of Providence: -8.2 percent

The table *Rhode Island State 5.0% Hotel Tax Allocation to Municipalities: Year-over-Year Collections* shows the portion of state 5.0 percent hotel tax revenues distributed to the cities and towns in Rhode Island. The three regional tourism districts with the largest nominal increases in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax for FY 2016 through June versus FY 2015 through June were:

- Aquidneck Island: \$306,207
- South County: \$140,785
- The Convention Authority of Providence: \$72,219

No regional tourism districts had a nominal decrease in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax for FY 2016 through June versus FY 2015 through June.

The three regional tourism districts with the largest percentage increases in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax for FY 2016 through June versus FY 2015 through June were:

- Block Island: 15.8 percent
- Statewide: 14.6 percent
- South County: 13.4 percent

No regional tourism districts had a percentage decrease in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax for FY 2016 through June versus FY 2015 through June.

Restatement of Prior Report Revenues for the July to November 2015 Period

The Office of Revenue Analysis (ORA) became aware of an error that staff had made in interpreting state 5.0 percent hotel tax data provided by the City of Newport on hotel taxes paid by hotels located in Newport. Specifically, ORA staff had used data reported by the City for a specific month as reflecting that month's hotel room rental activity when in fact that data reflected the prior month's hotel room rental activity.
