State of Rhode Island Monthly Hotel Report
FY 2013 5.0 Percent State Hotel Tax Allocation September 2012

Beginning in June 2012, the Rhode Island Department of Revenue will issue a report on the allocation of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax, as required by Rhode Island General Laws § 42-63.1-3 and § 42-63.1-12. The report is meant to be descriptive and does not purport to project or assess the collection of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax. The report provides information on the year-over-year and fiscal year-to-date allocation of the proceeds from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax.

SUMMARY OF THE 5.0 PERCENT STATE HOTEL TAX ALLOCATION

Analysis of Year-over-Year Allocation for September:

The following table is a summary of the year-over-year allocation of revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax.

The total revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax in September 2012 were \$1.78 million, or 1.6 percent more than the \$1.75 million received in September 2011. The largest share of these revenues was distributed to the State's eight regional tourism districts. In September 2012, the regional tourism districts received \$746,914 of the total revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax, an increase of \$17,263, or 2.4 percent, from the \$729,651 received in September 2011.

Twenty-five percent of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax are distributed to the municipalities where the individual hotels are located. The City of Providence receives the same allocation from all of the hotels located in the city, except from the formerly state-owned Westin Hotel. In September 2012, the State's cities and towns received \$419,867, an increase of \$7,231, or 1.8 percent, from the \$412,636 received in September 2011.

The Rhode Island Convention Center Authority (RICCA) receives 30.0 percent of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at the Westin Hotel. In September 2012, the RICCA received \$28,303, a decrease of \$323, or -1.1 percent, from the \$28,626 received in September 2011.

The State's share of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax is 21.0 percent, except from the Westin Hotel, where it is 27.0 percent. In September 2012, the State received \$378,161 from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax, an increase of \$5,783, or 1.6 percent, from the \$372,378 received in September 2011. The State's share of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent hotel tax is deposited into the miscellaneous departmental revenues category of departmental receipts.

The Providence Warwick Convention & Visitors Bureau (PWCVB) receives 23.0 percent of the revenues generated from the assessment of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at hotels located in Providence and Warwick, 12.0 percent of the revenues generated from the application of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at the Westin Hotel, and 7.0 percent of the revenues generated from the application of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax on all other hotels located in the State. In September 2012, the PWCVB received \$200,567, a decrease of \$2,107, or -1.0 percent, from the \$202,674 received in September 2011.

Analysis of Fiscal Year-to-Date through September:

The following table is a summary of the fiscal year-to-date over fiscal year-to-date through September allocation of revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax.

The total revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax in FY 2013 through September totaled \$5.90 million, or 7.1 percent more than the \$5.51 million received through September of FY 2012. The largest share of these revenues was distributed to the State's eight regional tourism districts. In FY 2013 through September, the regional tourism districts received \$2.50

million of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax, an increase of \$166,992, or 7.2 percent, from the \$2.33 million received through September of FY 2012.

Twenty-five percent of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax are distributed to the municipalities where the individual hotels are located. The City of Providence receives the same allocation from all of the hotels located in the city, except from the formerly state-owned Westin Hotel. In FY 2013 through September, the State's cities and towns received \$1.40 million, an increase of \$91,494, or 7.0 percent, from the \$1.31 million received through September of FY 2012.

RICCA receives 30.0 percent of the revenues generated from the levying of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at the Westin Hotel. In FY 2013, RICCA received \$85,407 through September, an increase of \$7,516, or 9.6 percent, from the \$77,891 received through September of FY 2012.

The State's share of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax is 21.0 percent, except from the Westin Hotel where it is 27.0 percent. In FY 2013 through September, the State received \$1.26 million, an increase of \$83,619, or 7.1 percent, from the \$1.17 million received through September of FY 2012 from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax.

The PWCVB receives 23.0 percent of the revenues generated from the assessment of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at hotels located in Providence and Warwick, 12.0 percent of the revenues generated from the levying of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at the Westin Hotel, and 7.0 percent of the revenues generated from the levying of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax on all other hotels located in the State. In FY 2013 through September, the PWCVB received \$659,002, an increase of \$41,408, or 6.7 percent, from the \$617,594 received through September of FY 2012.

DETAIL OF THE 5.0 PERCENT STATE HOTEL TAX ALLOCATION

Analysis of Year-over-Year Allocation through September:

The table, *Detail of Rhode Island 5.0% State Hotel Tax Allocation: Year-over-Year Analysis*, provides a breakdown of the distribution of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax on a year over year basis. The State has eight regional tourism districts: (1) the Aquidneck Island Tourism District¹; (2) Block Island; (3) the Convention Authority of the City of Providence; (4) East Providence²; (5) the Northern Rhode Island Tourism District³; (6) the South County Tourism District⁴; (7) the Statewide Tourism District⁵; and (8) the Warwick Department of Economic Development. The regional tourism districts are administered by either

a regional council, a municipal government entity, or, in the case of the Statewide Tourism District, the Rhode Island Economic Development Corporation.

In general, the regional tourism districts receive 47.0 percent of the revenues generated from the assessment of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at hotels located in the district. The exceptions to this allocation are the Convention Authority of the City of Providence, which receives 31.0 percent of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax revenues generated from all of the hotels situated in Providence including the Westin Hotel, and the Warwick Department of Economic Development, which receives 31.0 percent of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax revenues generated from all of the hotels located in the City of Warwick.

In September 2012, the Aquidneck Island Tourism District received the largest portion of the tourism districts' share at \$405,224, an increase of \$23,818, or 6.2 percent, from the \$381,406 received in September 2011. The Convention Authority of the City of Providence was the second largest recipient in September 2012 at \$109,866, a decrease of \$4,520, or -4.0 percent, from the \$114,386 received in September 2011. The South County Tourism District was the third largest recipient in September 2012 at \$92,604, an increase of \$852, or 0.9 percent, from the \$91,751 received in September 2011

The three regional tourism districts with the largest percentage increase in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between September 2012 and September 2011 were: Block Island, 12.1 percent; Aquidneck Island, 6.2 percent; and Northern Rhode Island, 1.4 percent. The three regional tourism districts with the largest percentage decrease in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between September 2012 and September 2011 were: the statewide district, -23.8 percent; East Providence, -9.6 percent; and the Warwick Department of Economic Development, -5.8 percent.

The three regional tourism districts with the largest nominal increase in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between September 2012 and September 2011 were: Aquidneck Island, \$23,818; Block Island, \$3,815; and South County, \$852. The three regional tourism districts with the largest nominal decrease in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between September 2012 and September 2011 were: the Convention Authority of the City of Providence, -\$4,520; the Warwick Department of Economic Development, -\$3,569, and the statewide district, -\$3,221.

The table, *Rhode Island 5.0% State Hotel Tax Allocation to Municipalities: Year-over-Year Analysis*, shows the portion of revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax distributed to the cities and towns in Rhode Island. In September 2012, Newport received the largest portion of the municipalities' share of the revenue generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at \$165,486, an increase of \$14,165, or 9.4 percent, from the \$151,320 received in September 2011. Providence received the second largest portion of the municipalities' share of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax in September 2012 at \$65,015, a decrease of \$3,376, or -4.9 percent, from the \$68,392 received in September 2011. Warwick received the third largest portion of the municipalities' share of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax in September 2012 at \$46,989, a decrease of \$2,878, or -5.8 percent, from the \$49,867 received in September 2011.

The five municipalities with the largest percentage increase in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between September 2012 and September 2011 were: East Greenwich, 162.1 percent; Little Compton, 94.5 percent; Johnston, 55.7 percent; Woonsocket, 51.7 percent; and Narragansett, 33.3 percent. The five municipalities with the largest percentage decrease in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between September 2012 and September 2011 were: Coventry, -46.5 percent; Cranston, -32.1 percent; West Warwick, -28.3 percent; Pawtucket, -27.9 percent; and Charlestown, -24.9 percent.

The five municipalities with the largest nominal increase in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between September 2012 and September 2011 were: Newport, \$14,165; New Shoreham, \$2,029; Narragansett, \$1,695; Westerly, \$1,615; and Woonsocket, \$1,194. The five municipalities with the largest nominal decrease in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between September 2012 and September 2011 were: Providence, -\$3,376; Warwick, -\$2,878; Middletown, -\$2,663; Coventry, -\$2,365; and West Warwick, -\$1,708.

Analysis of Fiscal Year-to-Date through September:

The table, *Detail of Rhode Island 5.0% State Hotel Tax Allocation: Fiscal Year-to-Date Analysis*, provides a breakdown of the distribution of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax on a fiscal year-to-date basis. In general, the regional tourism districts receive 47.0 percent of the revenues generated from the assessment of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at hotels located in the district. The exceptions to this allocation are the Convention Authority of the City of Providence, which receives 31.0 percent of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax revenues generated from all of the hotels situated in Providence including the Westin Hotel, and the Warwick Department of Economic Development, which receives 31.0 percent of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax revenues generated from all of the hotels located in the City of Warwick.

In FY 2013 through September, the Aquidneck Island Tourism District received the largest portion of the tourism districts' share at \$1.18 million, an increase of \$83,462, or 7.6 percent, from the \$1.10 million received through September of FY 2012. The South County Tourism District was the second largest recipient in FY 2013 through September at \$436,159, an increase of \$25,109, or 6.1 percent, from the \$411,050 received through September of FY 2012. The Convention Authority of the City of Providence was the third largest recipient in FY 2013 through September at \$343,986, an increase of \$23,542, or 7.3 percent, from the \$320,444 received through September of FY 2012.

The three regional tourism districts with the largest percentage increase in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2013 through September and FY 2012 through September were: Northern Rhode Island, 12.8 percent; Block Island, 11.2 percent; and Aquidneck Island, 7.6 percent. The only regional tourism district with a percentage decrease in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2013 through September and FY 2012 through September was the statewide district at -12.2 percent.

The three regional tourism districts with the largest nominal increase in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2013 through September and FY 2012 through September were: Aquidneck Island, \$83,462; South County, \$25,109; and the Convention Authority of the City of Providence, \$23,542. The only regional tourism district with a nominal decrease in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2013 through September and FY 2012 through September was the statewide district at -\$5,122.

The table, *Rhode Island 5.0% State Hotel Tax Allocation to Municipalities: Fiscal Year-to-Date Analysis*, shows the portion of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax distributed to the cities and towns in Rhode Island. In FY 2013 through September, Newport received the largest portion of the municipalities' share of the revenue generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at \$449,999, an increase of \$43,655, or 10.7 percent, from the \$406,344 received through September of FY 2012. Providence received the second largest portion of the municipalities' share of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax in FY 2013 through September at \$206,236, an increase of \$12,722, or 6.6 percent, from the \$193,513 received through September of FY 2012. Middletown received the third largest portion of the municipalities' share of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax in FY 2013 through September at \$164,110, an increase of \$215, or 0.1 percent, from the \$163,894 received through September of FY 2012.

The five municipalities with the largest percentage increase in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2013 through September and FY 2012 through September were: East Greenwich, 351.1 percent; Woonsocket, 57.2 percent; Johnston, 29.8 percent; West Greenwich, 29.1 percent; and Bristol, 25.4 percent. The five municipalities with the largest percentage decrease in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2013 through September and FY 2012 through September were: Coventry, -31.3 percent; Little Compton, -17.4 percent; Scituate, -15.7 percent; West Warwick, -15.2 percent; and Cranston, -8.3 percent.

The five municipalities with the largest nominal increase in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2013 through September and FY 2012 through September were: Newport, \$43,655; Providence, \$12,722; Westerly, \$10,232; New Shoreham, \$10,185; and Warwick, \$7,252. The five municipalities with the largest nominal decrease in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2013 through September and FY 2012 through September were: Coventry, -\$4,723; West Warwick, -\$2,844; Little Compton, -\$602; Charlestown, -\$561; and Portsmouth, -\$190.
