State of Rhode Island Monthly Hotel Report FY 2014 5.0 Percent State Hotel Tax Allocation April 2014

Beginning in June 2012, the Rhode Island Department of Revenue will issue a report on the allocation of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax, as required by Rhode Island General Laws §§ 42-63.1-3 and 42-63.1-12. The report is meant to be descriptive and does not purport to project or assess the collection of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax. The report provides information on the year-over-year and fiscal year-to-date allocation of the proceeds from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax.

SUMMARY OF THE 5.0 PERCENT STATE HOTEL TAX ALLOCATION

Analysis of Year-over-Year Allocation for April:

The following table is a summary of the year-over-year allocation of revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax.

The total revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax in April 2014 were \$830,464, a decrease of \$114,299 or -12.1 percent compared to the \$944,763 received in April 2013. The largest share of these revenues was distributed to the State's eight regional tourism districts. In April 2014, the regional tourism districts received \$316,921 of the total revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax, a decrease of \$42,313 or -11.8 percent from the \$359,233 received in April 2013.

Twenty-five percent of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax are distributed to the municipalities where the individual hotels are located. The City of Providence receives the same allocation from all of the hotels located in the city, except from the Omni Providence Hotel. In April 2014, the State's cities and towns received \$191,166, a decrease of \$7,859 or -3.9 percent from the \$199,025 received in April 2013.

The Rhode Island Convention Center Authority (RICCA) receives 30.0 percent of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at the Omni Providence Hotel. In April 2014, the RICCA received \$19,740, a decrease of \$24,859 or -55.7 percent from the \$44,599 received in April 2013.

The State's share of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax is 21.0 percent, except from the Omni Providence Hotel where it is 27.0 percent. In April 2014, the State received \$178,345 from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax, a decrease of \$28,975 or -14.0 percent from the \$207,230 received in April 2013. The State's share of revenues generated from the 5.0 percent hotel tax is deposited into the miscellaneous departmental revenues component of departmental receipts.

The Providence Warwick Convention & Visitors Bureau (PWCVB) receives 23.0 percent of the revenues generated from the assessment of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at hotels located in Providence and Warwick, 12.0 percent of the revenues generated from the application of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at the Omni Providence Hotel, and 7.0 percent of the revenues generated from the application of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax on all other hotels located in the State. In April 2014, the PWCVB received \$124,292, a decrease of \$10,294 or -7.6 percent from the \$134,586 received in April 2013.

Analysis of Fiscal Year-to-Date through April:

The following table is a summary of the fiscal year-to-date allocation of revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax.

The total revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax in FY 2014 through April were \$12.67 million, an increase of \$489,114 or 4.0 percent compared to the \$12.18 million received through April of FY 2013. The largest share of these revenues was distributed to the State's eight regional tourism districts. In FY 2014 through April, the regional tourism districts received \$5.16 million of the total revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax, an increase of \$216,767 or 4.4 percent over the \$4.94 million received through April of FY 2013.

Twenty-five percent of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax are distributed to the municipalities where the individual hotels are located. The City of Providence receives the same allocation from all of the hotels located in the city, except from the Omni Providence Hotel. In FY 2014 through April, the State's cities and towns received \$2.98 million, an increase of \$144,158 or 5.1 percent over the \$2.83 million received through April of FY 2013.

RICCA receives 30.0 percent of the revenues generated from the levying of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at the Omni Providence Hotel. In FY 2014, RICCA received \$229,715 through April, a decrease of \$26,255 or -10.3 percent from the \$255,971 received through April of FY 2013.

The State's share of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax is 21.0 percent, except from the Omni Providence Hotel where it is 27.0 percent. In FY 2014 through April, the State received \$2.71 million, an increase of \$97,463 or 3.7 percent over the \$2.61 million received through April of FY 2013.

The PWCVB receives 23.0 percent of the revenues generated from the assessment of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at hotels located in Providence and Warwick, 12.0 percent of the revenues generated from the levying of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at the Omni Providence Hotel, and 7.0 percent of the revenues generated from the levying of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax on all other hotels located in the State. In FY 2014 through April, the PWCVB received \$1.60 million, an increase of \$56,982 or 3.7 percent over the \$1.54 million received through April of FY 2013.

DETAIL OF THE 5.0 PERCENT STATE HOTEL TAX ALLOCATION

Analysis of Year-over-Year Allocation for April:

The table *Detail of Rhode Island 5.0% State Hotel Tax Allocation: Year-over-Year Collections* provides a breakdown of the distribution of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax on a year over year basis. The State has eight regional tourism districts: (1) the Aquidneck Island Tourism District¹; (2) Block Island; (3) the Convention Authority of the City of Providence; (4) East Providence²; (5) the Northern Rhode Island Tourism District³; (6) the South County Tourism District⁴; (7) the Statewide Tourism District⁵; and (8) the Warwick Department of Economic Development. The regional tourism districts are administered by either a regional council, a municipal government entity, or, in the case of the Statewide Tourism District, the Rhode Island Commerce Corporation.

In general, the regional tourism districts receive 47.0 percent of the revenues generated from the assessment of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at hotels located within the district. The exceptions

to this allocation are the Convention Authority of the City of Providence, which receives 31.0 percent of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax revenues generated from all of the hotels situated in Providence including the Omni Providence Hotel, and the Warwick Department of Economic Development, which receives 31.0 percent of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax revenues generated from all of the hotels located within the City of Warwick.

In April 2014, the Convention Authority of the City of Providence received the largest portion of the tourism districts' share at \$93,351, a decrease of \$24,193 or -20.6 percent from the \$117,544 received in April 2013. The Aquidneck Island Tourism District was the second largest recipient in April 2014 at \$90,989, a decrease of \$13,127 or -12.6 percent from the \$104,116 received in April 2013. The Warwick Department of Economic Development was the third largest recipient in April 2014 at \$48,856, an increase of \$2,090 or 4.5 percent over the \$46,766 received in April 2013.

The three regional tourism districts with a percentage increase in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between April 2014 and April 2013 were: the statewide district, 28.3 percent; the Warwick Department of Economic Development, 4.5 percent; and South County, 0.2 percent. The three regional tourism districts with the largest percentage decrease in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between April 2014 and April 2013 were: Block Island, -64.2 percent; the Convention Authority of the City of Providence, -20.6 percent; and Northern Rhode Island, -13.9 percent.

The three regional tourism districts with a nominal increase in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between April 2014 and April 2013 were: the statewide district, \$2,216; the Warwick Department of Economic Development, \$2,090; and South County, \$88. The three regional tourism districts with the largest nominal decrease in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between April 2014 and April 2013 were: the Convention Authority of the City of Providence, \$(24,193); Aquidneck Island, \$(13,127); and Block Island, \$(4,956).

The table *Rhode Island 5.0% State Hotel Tax Allocation to Municipalities: Year-over-Year Collections* shows the portion of revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax distributed to the cities and towns in Rhode Island. In April 2014, Providence received the largest portion of the municipalities' share of the revenue generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at \$58,834, an increase of \$1,205 or 2.1 percent more than the \$57,628 received in April 2013. Warwick received the second largest portion of the municipalities' share of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax in April 2014 at \$39,400, an increase of \$1,686 or 4.5 percent more than the \$37,715 received in April 2013. Newport received the third largest portion of the municipalities' share of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax in April 2014 at \$28,711, a decrease of \$8,243 or -22.3 percent less than the \$36,954 received in April 2013.

The five municipalities with the largest percentage increase in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between April 2014 and April 2013 were: Portsmouth, 120.0 percent; Glocester, 109.9 percent; Scituate, 81.6 percent; West Warwick, 43.1 percent; and Cranston, 41.8 percent. The five municipalities with the largest percentage decrease in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between April 2014 and April 2013 were: Little Compton, -72.3

percent; Pawtucket, -66.3 percent; New Shoreham, -64.2 percent; Johnston, -54.0 percent; and Narragansett, -53.4 percent.

The five municipalities with the largest nominal increase in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between April 2014 and April 2013 were: Middletown, \$2,175; Warwick, \$1,686; West Warwick, \$1,349; Providence, \$1,205; and Westerly, \$704. The five municipalities with the largest nominal decrease in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between April 2014 and April 2013 were: Newport, \$(8,243); New Shoreham, \$(2,636); Narragansett, \$(1,212); Pawtucket, \$(1,183); and Bristol, \$(1,006).

Analysis of Fiscal Year-to-Date through April:

The table *Detail of Rhode Island 5.0% State Hotel Tax Allocation: Fiscal Year-to-Date Collections* provides a breakdown of the distribution of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax on a fiscal year-to-date basis. In general, the regional tourism districts receive 47.0 percent of the revenues generated from the assessment of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at hotels located in the district. The exceptions to this allocation are the Convention Authority of the City of Providence, which receives 31.0 percent of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax revenues generated from all of the hotels situated in Providence including the Omni Providence Hotel, and the Warwick Department of Economic Development, which receives 31.0 percent of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax revenues generated from all of the hotels located in the City of Warwick.

In FY 2014 through April, the Aquidneck Island Tourism District received the largest portion of the tourism districts' share at \$2.22 million, an increase of \$81,970 or 3.8 percent more than the \$2.14 million received through April of FY 2013. The Convention Authority of the City of Providence was the second largest recipient in FY 2014 through April at \$1.01 million, an increase of \$13,189 or 1.3 percent more than the \$995,664 received through April of FY 2013. The South County Tourism District was the third largest recipient in FY 2014 through April at \$747,628, an increase of \$64,498 or 9.4 percent more than the \$683,129 received through April of FY 2013.

The three regional tourism districts with the largest percentage increase in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2014 through April and FY 2013 through April were: East Providence, 17.0 percent; Block Island, 12.2 percent; and the statewide district, 10.9 percent. No regional tourism districts had a decrease in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2014 through April and FY 2013 through April.

The three regional tourism districts with the largest nominal increase in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2014 through April and FY 2013 through April were: Aquidneck Island, \$81,970; South County, \$64,498; Block Island, \$25,837. No regional tourism districts had a decrease in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2014 through April and FY 2013 through April.

The table *Rhode Island 5.0% State Hotel Tax Allocation to Municipalities: Fiscal Year-to-Date Collections* shows the portion of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax

distributed to the cities and towns in Rhode Island. In FY 2014 through April, Newport received the largest portion of the municipalities' share of the revenue generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at \$875,000, an increase of \$23,007 or 2.7 percent more than the \$851,993 received through April of FY 2013. Providence received the second largest portion of the municipalities' share of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax in FY 2014 through April at \$622,161, an increase of \$32,516 or 5.5 percent more than the \$589,646 received through April of FY 2013. Warwick received the third largest portion of the municipalities' share of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax in FY 2014 through April at \$426,635, an increase of \$9,859 or 2.4 percent more than the \$416,776 received through April of FY 2013.

The five municipalities with the largest percentage increase in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2014 through April and FY 2013 through April were: Foster, 141.4 percent; East Greenwich, 58.2 percent; Scituate, 49.5 percent; Glocester, 46.1 percent; and Coventry, 20.6 percent. The five municipalities with the largest percentage decrease in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2014 through April and FY 2013 through April were: Little Compton, -57.5 percent; Woonsocket, -25.2 percent; North Smithfield, -13.1 percent; Richmond, -12.7 percent; and Jamestown, -11.7 percent.

The five municipalities with the largest nominal increase in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2014 through April and FY 2013 through April were: Providence, \$32,516; Westerly, \$28,096; Middletown, \$23,556; Newport, \$23,007; and New Shoreham, \$13,743. The five municipalities with the largest nominal decrease in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2014 through April and FY 2013 through April were: Woonsocket, \$(7,280); Little Compton, \$(3,013); Narragansett, \$(2,068); Jamestown, \$(497); and Johnston, \$(268).
