State of Rhode Island Monthly Hotel Report  
FY 2014 5.0 Percent State Hotel Tax Allocation December 2013

Beginning in June 2012, the Rhode Island Department of Revenue will issue a report on the allocation of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax, as required by Rhode Island General Laws §§ 42-63.1-3 and 42-63.1-12. The report is meant to be descriptive and does not purport to project or assess the collection of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax. The report provides information on the year-over-year and fiscal year-to-date allocation of the proceeds from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax.

**SUMMARY OF THE 5.0 PERCENT STATE HOTEL TAX ALLOCATION**

*Analysis of Year-over-Year Allocation for December:*

The following table is a summary of the year-over-year allocation of revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax.

The total revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax in December 2013 were \$684,001, an increase of \$12,837 or 1.9 percent compared to the \$671,164 received in December 2012. The largest share of these revenues was distributed to the State's eight regional tourism districts. In December 2013, the regional tourism districts received \$270,773 of the total revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax, an increase of \$7,353 or 2.8 percent compared to the \$263,420 received in December 2012.

Twenty-five percent of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax are distributed to the municipalities where the individual hotels are located. The City of Providence receives the same allocation from all of the hotels located in the city, except from the Omni Providence Hotel. In December 2013, the State's cities and towns received \$161,061, an increase of \$6,238 or 4.0 percent over the \$154,823 received in December 2012.

The Rhode Island Convention Center Authority (RICCA) receives 30.0 percent of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at the Omni Providence Hotel. In December 2013, the RICCA received \$11,927 a decrease of \$3,634 or -23.4 percent over the \$15,562 received in December 2012.

The State's share of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax is 21.0 percent, except from the Omni Providence Hotel where it is 27.0 percent. In December 2013, the State received \$146,026 from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax, an increase of \$1,969 or 1.4 percent over the \$144,057 received in December 2012. The State's share of revenues generated from the 5.0 percent hotel tax is deposited into the miscellaneous departmental revenues component of departmental receipts.

The Providence Warwick Convention & Visitors Bureau (PWCVB) receives 23.0 percent of the revenues generated from the assessment of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at hotels located in Providence and Warwick, 12.0 percent of the revenues generated from the application of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at the Omni Providence Hotel, and 7.0 percent of the revenues generated from the application of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax on all other hotels located in the State. In December 2013, the PWCVB received \$94,214, an increase of \$911 or 1.0 percent over the \$93,303 received in December 2012.

***Analysis of Fiscal Year-to-Date through December:***

The following table is a summary of the fiscal year-to-date allocation of revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax.

The total revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax in FY 2014 through December were \$9.71 million, an increase of \$537,007 or 5.9 percent over the \$9.17 million received through December of FY 2013. The largest share of these revenues was distributed to the State's eight regional tourism districts. In FY 2014 through December, the regional tourism districts received \$4.04 million of the total revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax, an increase of \$231,713 or 6.1 percent over the \$3.81 million received through December of FY 2013.

Twenty-five percent of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax are distributed to the municipalities where the individual hotels are located. The City of Providence receives the same allocation from all of the hotels located in the city, except from the Omni Providence Hotel. In FY 2014 through December, the State's cities and towns received \$2.30 million, an increase of \$139,161 or 6.4 percent over the \$2.16 million received through December of FY 2013.

RICCA receives 30.0 percent of the revenues generated from the levying of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at the Omni Providence Hotel. In FY 2014, RICCA received \$155,792 through December, a decrease of \$5,891 or -3.6 percent over the \$161,683 received through December of FY 2013.

The State's share of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax is 21.0 percent, except from the Omni Providence Hotel where it is 27.0 percent. In FY 2014 through December, the State received \$2.07 million, an increase of \$111,593 or 5.7 percent over the \$1.96 million received through December of FY 2013.

The PWCVB receives 23.0 percent of the revenues generated from the assessment of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at hotels located in Providence and Warwick, 12.0 percent of the revenues generated from the levying of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at the Omni Providence Hotel, and 7.0 percent of the revenues generated from the levying of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax on all other hotels located in the State. In FY 2014 through December, the PWCVB received \$1.15 million, an increase of \$60,431 or 5.6 percent over the \$1.09 million received through December of FY 2013.

## **DETAIL OF THE 5.0 PERCENT STATE HOTEL TAX ALLOCATION**

### ***Analysis of Year-over-Year Allocation for December:***

The table *Detail of Rhode Island 5.0% State Hotel Tax Allocation: Year-over-Year Collections* provides a breakdown of the distribution of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax on a year over year basis. The State has eight regional tourism districts: (1) the Aquidneck Island Tourism District<sup>1</sup>; (2) Block Island; (3) the Convention Authority of the City of Providence; (4) East Providence<sup>2</sup>; (5) the Northern Rhode Island Tourism District<sup>3</sup>; (6) the South County Tourism District<sup>4</sup>; (7) the Statewide Tourism District<sup>5</sup>; and (8) the Warwick Department of Economic Development. The regional tourism districts are administered by either

a regional council, a municipal government entity, or, in the case of the Statewide Tourism District, the Rhode Island Commerce Corporation.

In general, the regional tourism districts receive 47.0 percent of the revenues generated from the assessment of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at hotels located within the district. The exceptions to this allocation are the Convention Authority of the City of Providence, which receives 31.0 percent of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax revenues generated from all of the hotels situated in Providence including the Omni Providence Hotel, and the Warwick Department of Economic Development, which receives 31.0 percent of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax revenues generated from all of the hotels located within the City of Warwick.

In December 2013, the Aquidneck Island Tourism District received the largest portion of the tourism districts' share at \$108,361, an increase of \$2,450 or 2.3 percent over the \$105,911 received in December 2012. The Convention Authority of the City of Providence was the second largest recipient in December 2013 at \$62,658, a decrease of \$433 or -0.7 percent over the \$63,090 received in December 2012. The Warwick Department of Economic Development was the third largest recipient in December 2013 at \$35,588, a decrease of \$2,124 or -5.6 percent over the \$37,712 received in December 2012.

The three regional tourism districts with the largest percentage increase in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between December 2013 and December 2012 were: Block Island, 1,504.2 percent; East Providence, 37.1 percent; and statewide district, 21.9 percent. The three regional tourism districts with a percentage decrease in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between December 2013 and December 2012 were: South County, -19.4 percent; Warwick Department of Economic Development, -5.6 percent; and Northern Rhode Island, -2.9 percent.

The three regional tourism districts with the largest nominal increase in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between December 2013 and December 2012 were: Block Island, \$12,140; Aquidneck Island, \$2,450; and the statewide district, \$1,054. The three regional tourism districts with the largest nominal decrease in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between December 2013 and December 2012 were: South County, -\$5,723; the Warwick Department of Economic Development, -\$2,124 and Northern Rhode Island, -\$578.

The table *Rhode Island 5.0% State Hotel Tax Allocation to Municipalities: Year-over-Year Collections* shows the portion of revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax distributed to the cities and towns in Rhode Island. In December 2013, Newport received the largest portion of the municipalities' share of the revenue generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at \$47,134, an increase of \$3,074 or 7.0 percent more than the \$44,060 received in December 2012. Providence received the second largest portion of the municipalities' share of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax in December 2013 at \$40,591, an increase of \$2,680 or 7.1 percent over the \$37,911 received in December 2012. Warwick received the third largest portion of the municipalities' share of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax in December 2013 at \$28,700, a decrease of \$1,713 or -5.6 percent over the \$30,413 received in December 2012.

The five municipalities with the largest percentage increase in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between December 2013 and December 2012 were: New Shoreham, 1,504.2 percent; Johnston, 1,005.7 percent; Glocester, 426.2 percent; East Greenwich, 330.7 percent; and Scituate, 199.4 percent. The five municipalities with the largest percentage decrease in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between December 2013 and December 2012 were: North Kingstown, -93.3 percent; Woonsocket, -44.8 percent; Portsmouth, -35.9 percent; Westerly, -27.9 percent; and Richmond, -27.8 percent.

The five municipalities with the largest nominal increase in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between December 2013 and December 2012 were: New Shoreham, \$6,458; Newport, \$3,074; Providence, \$2,680; Coventry, \$773; and Smithfield, \$372. The five municipalities with the largest nominal decrease in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between December 2013 and December 2012 were: North Kingstown, -\$2,070; West Middletown, -\$1,824; Westerly, -\$1,715; Warwick, -\$1,713; and Woonsocket, -\$1,072.

### ***Analysis of Fiscal Year-to-Date through December:***

The table *Detail of Rhode Island 5.0% State Hotel Tax Allocation: Fiscal Year-to-Date Collections* provides a breakdown of the distribution of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax on a fiscal year-to-date basis. In general, the regional tourism districts receive 47.0 percent of the revenues generated from the assessment of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at hotels located in the district. The exceptions to this allocation are the Convention Authority of the City of Providence, which receives 31.0 percent of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax revenues generated from all of the hotels situated in Providence including the Omni Providence Hotel, and the Warwick Department of Economic Development, which receives 31.0 percent of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax revenues generated from all of the hotels located in the City of Warwick.

In FY 2014 through December, the Aquidneck Island Tourism District received the largest portion of the tourism districts' share at \$1.90 million, an increase of \$88,104 or 4.9 percent over the \$1.81 million received through December of FY 2013. The Convention Authority of the City of Providence was the second largest recipient in FY 2014 through December at \$667,164, an increase of \$32,544 or 5.1 percent over the \$634,620 received through December of FY 2013. The South County Tourism District was the third largest recipient in FY 2014 through December at \$616,344, an increase of \$58,409 or 10.5 percent over the \$557,935 received through December of FY 2013.

The three regional tourism districts with the largest percentage increase in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2014 through December and FY 2013 through December were: East Providence, 25.4 percent; the statewide district, 17.0 percent; and Block Island, 13.3 percent. No regional tourism districts had a decrease in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2014 through December and FY 2013 through December.

The three regional tourism districts with the largest nominal increase in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2014 through December and FY 2013 through

December were: Aquidneck Island, \$88,104; South County, \$58,409; and the Convention Authority of the City of Providence, \$32,544. No regional tourism districts had a decrease in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2014 through December and FY 2013 through December.

The table *Rhode Island 5.0% State Hotel Tax Allocation to Municipalities: Fiscal Year-to-Date Collections* shows the portion of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax distributed to the cities and towns in Rhode Island. In FY 2014 through December, Newport received the largest portion of the municipalities' share of the revenue generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at \$754,678, an increase of \$25,362 or 3.5 percent over the \$729,316 received through December of FY 2013. Providence received the second largest portion of the municipalities' share of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax in FY 2014 through December at \$408,209, an increase of \$31,154 or 8.3 percent over the \$377,055 received through December of FY 2013. Warwick received the third largest portion of the municipalities' share of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax in FY 2014 through December at \$282,019, an increase of \$6,068 or 2.2 percent over the \$275,951 received through December of FY 2013.

The five municipalities with the largest percentage increase in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2014 through December and FY 2013 through December were: Scituate, 51.2 percent; Coventry, 48.6 percent; Glocester, 34.4 percent; East Greenwich, 25.9 percent; and East Providence, 25.4 percent. The five municipalities with the largest percentage decrease in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2014 through December and FY 2013 through December were: Little Compton, -27.8 percent; North Smithfield, -26.4 percent; Woonsocket, -26.3 percent; Richmond, -15.5 percent; and Jamestown, -9.3 percent.

The five municipalities with the largest nominal increase in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2014 through December and FY 2013 through December were: Providence, \$31,154; Newport, \$25,362; Westerly, \$26,748; Middletown, \$21,150; and New Shoreham, \$14,181. The five municipalities with the largest nominal decrease in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2014 through December and FY 2013 through December were: Woonsocket, -\$4,952; North Kingstown, -\$1,065; Little Compton, -\$845; Narragansett, -\$809; and Jamestown, -\$334.
