State of Rhode Island Monthly Hotel Report
FY 2014 5.0 Percent State Hotel Tax Allocation June 2014

Beginning in June 2012, the Rhode Island Department of Revenue will issue a report on the allocation of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax, as required by Rhode Island General Laws §§ 42-63.1-3 and 42-63.1-12. The report is meant to be descriptive and does not purport to project or assess the collection of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax. The report provides information on the year-over-year and fiscal year-to-date allocation of the proceeds from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax.

SUMMARY OF THE 5.0 PERCENT STATE HOTEL TAX ALLOCATION

Analysis of Year-over-Year Allocation for June:

The following table is a summary of the year-over-year allocation of revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax.

The total revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax in June 2014 were \$1.67 million, an increase of \$190,608 or 12.9 percent compared to the \$1.48 million received in June 2013. The largest share of these revenues was distributed to the State's eight regional tourism districts. In June 2014, the regional tourism districts received \$685,136 of the total revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax, an increase of \$82,645 or 13.7 percent from the \$602,491 received in June 2013.

Twenty-five percent of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax are distributed to the municipalities where the individual hotels are located. The City of Providence receives the same allocation from all of the hotels located in the city except from the Omni Providence Hotel. In June 2014, the State's cities and towns received \$396,026, an increase of \$47,584 or 13.7 percent from the \$348,442 received in June 2013.

The Rhode Island Convention Center Authority (RICCA) receives 30.0 percent of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at the Omni Providence Hotel. In June 2014, the RICCA received \$25,801, an increase of \$82 or 0.3 percent from the \$25,719 received in June 2013.

The State's share of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax is 21.0 percent, except from the Omni Providence Hotel where it is 27.0 percent. In June 2014, the State received \$355,883 from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax, an increase of \$40,044 or 12.7 percent from the \$315,839 received in June 2013. The State's share of revenues generated from the 5.0 percent hotel tax is deposited into the miscellaneous departmental revenues component of departmental receipts.

The Providence Warwick Convention & Visitors Bureau (PWCVB) receives 23.0 percent of the revenues generated from the assessment of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at hotels located in Providence and Warwick, 12.0 percent of the revenues generated from the application of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at the Omni Providence Hotel, and 7.0 percent of the revenues generated from the application of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax on all other hotels located in the State. In June 2014, the PWCVB received \$207,263, an increase of \$20,254 or 10.8 percent from the \$187,009 received in June 2013.

Analysis of Fiscal Year-to-Date through June:

The following table is a summary of the fiscal year-to-date allocation of revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax.

The total revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax in FY 2014 were \$15.69 million, an increase of \$881,081 or 5.9 percent compared to the \$14.81 million received in FY 2013. The largest share of these revenues was distributed to the State's eight regional tourism districts. In FY 2014, the regional tourism districts received \$6.37 million of the total revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax, an increase of \$365,895 or 6.1 percent over the \$6.00 million received in FY 2013.

Twenty-five percent of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax are distributed to the municipalities where the individual hotels are located. The City of Providence receives the same allocation from all of the hotels located in the city except from the Omni Providence Hotel. In FY 2014, the State's cities and towns received \$3.68 million, an increase of \$215,228 or 6.2 percent over the \$3.46 million received in FY 2013.

RICCA receives 30.0 percent of the revenues generated from the levying of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at the Omni Providence Hotel. In FY 2014, RICCA received \$291,472, an increase of \$6,050 or 2.1 percent from the \$285,422 received in FY 2013.

The State's share of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax is 21.0 percent, except from the Omni Providence Hotel where it is 27.0 percent. In FY 2014, the State received \$3.35 million, an increase of \$186,237 or 5.9 percent over the \$3.17 million received in FY 2013.

The PWCVB receives 23.0 percent of the revenues generated from the assessment of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at hotels located in Providence and Warwick, 12.0 percent of the revenues generated from the levying of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at the Omni Providence Hotel, and 7.0 percent of the revenues generated from the levying of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax on all other hotels located in the State. In FY 2014, the PWCVB received \$2.00 million, an increase of \$107,671 or 5.7 percent over the \$1.89 million received in FY 2013.

DETAIL OF THE 5.0 PERCENT STATE HOTEL TAX ALLOCATION

Analysis of Year-over-Year Allocation for June:

The table *Detail of Rhode Island 5.0% State Hotel Tax Allocation: Year-over-Year Collections* provides a breakdown of the distribution of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax on a year over year basis. The State has eight regional tourism districts: (1) the Aquidneck Island Tourism District¹; (2) Block Island; (3) the Convention Authority of the City of Providence; (4) East Providence²; (5) the Northern Rhode Island Tourism District³; (6) the South County Tourism District⁴; (7) the Statewide Tourism District⁵; and (8) the Warwick Department of Economic Development. The regional tourism districts are administered by either a regional council, a municipal government entity, or, in the case of the Statewide Tourism District, the Rhode Island Commerce Corporation.

In general, the regional tourism districts receive 47.0 percent of the revenues generated from the assessment of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at hotels located within the district. The exceptions

to this allocation are the Convention Authority of the City of Providence, which receives 31.0 percent of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax revenues generated from all of the hotels situated in Providence including the Omni Providence Hotel, and the Warwick Department of Economic Development, which receives 31.0 percent of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax revenues generated from all of the hotels located within the City of Warwick.

In June 2014, the Aquidneck Island Tourism District received the largest portion of the tourism districts' share at \$277,945, an increase of \$40,105 or 16.9 percent from the \$237,840 received in June 2013. The Convention Authority of the City of Providence was the second largest recipient in June 2014 at \$121,712, an increase of \$7,448 or 6.5 percent from the \$114,264 received in June 2013. The South County district was the third largest recipient in June 2014 at \$117,638, an increase of \$13,924 or 13.4 percent over the \$103,714 received in June 2013.

The three regional tourism districts with the largest percentage increase in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between June 2014 and June 2013 were: Northern Rhode Island, 28.0 percent; Aquidneck Island, 16.9 percent; and Block Island, 15.5 percent. No regional tourism districts had a decrease in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between June 2014 and June 2013.

The three regional tourism districts with the largest nominal increase in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between June 2014 and June 2013 were: Aquidneck Island, \$40,105; South County, \$13,924; and Northern Rhode Island, \$7,794. No regional tourism districts had a decrease in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between June 2014 and June 2013.

The table *Rhode Island 5.0% State Hotel Tax Allocation to Municipalities: Year-over-Year Collections* shows the portion of revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax distributed to the cities and towns in Rhode Island. In June 2014, Newport received the largest portion of the municipalities' share of the revenue generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at \$92,953, an increase of \$8,336 or 9.9 percent more than the \$84,617 received in June 2013. Providence received the second largest portion of the municipalities' share of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax in June 2014 at \$76,654, an increase of \$5,938 or 8.4 percent more than the \$70,715 received in June 2013. Warwick received the third largest portion of the municipalities' share of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax in June 2014 at \$57,808, an increase of \$4,839 or 9.1 percent more than the \$52,968 received in June 2013.

The five municipalities with the largest percentage increase in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between June 2014 and June 2013 were: Johnston, 2,382.6 percent; Bristol, 392.4 percent; Narragansett, 164.0 percent; Glocester, 152.9 percent; and East Greenwich, 136.0 percent. The three municipalities with a percentage decrease in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between June 2014 and June 2013 were: Cranston, -32.2 percent; Richmond, -1.7 percent; and Coventry, -1.3 percent.

The five municipalities with the largest nominal increase in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between June 2014 and June 2013 were: Middletown, \$10,683; Newport, \$8,336; Providence, \$5,938; Warwick, \$4,839; and Narragansett, \$3,286. The four

municipalities with a nominal decrease in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between June 2014 and June 2013 were: Cranston, \$(181); Coventry, \$(65); Richmond, \$(4); and Foster, \$(2).

Analysis of Fiscal Year-to-Date through June:

The table *Detail of Rhode Island 5.0% State Hotel Tax Allocation: Fiscal Year-to-Date Collections* provides a breakdown of the distribution of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax on a fiscal year-to-date basis. In general, the regional tourism districts receive 47.0 percent of the revenues generated from the assessment of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at hotels located in the district. The exceptions to this allocation are the Convention Authority of the City of Providence, which receives 31.0 percent of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax revenues generated from all of the hotels situated in Providence including the Omni Providence Hotel, and the Warwick Department of Economic Development, which receives 31.0 percent of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax revenues generated from all of the hotels located in the City of Warwick.

In FY 2014, the Aquidneck Island Tourism District received the largest portion of the tourism districts' share at \$2.66 million, an increase of \$129,742 or 5.1 percent more than the \$2.53 million received in FY 2013. The Convention Authority of the City of Providence was the second largest recipient in FY 2014 at \$1.28 million, an increase of \$67,261 or 5.5 percent more than the \$1.21 million received in FY 2013. The South County Tourism District was the third largest recipient in FY 2014 at \$937,975, an increase of \$80,894 or 9.4 percent more than the \$857,081 received in FY 2013.

The three regional tourism districts with the largest percentage increase in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2014 and FY 2013 were: East Providence, 20.4 percent; the statewide district, 12.5 percent; and Block Island, 11.9 percent. No regional tourism districts had a decrease in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2014 and FY 2013.


The three regional tourism districts with the largest nominal increase in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2014 and FY 2013 were: Aquidneck Island, \$129,742; South County, \$80,894; the Convention Authority of the City of Providence, \$67,261. No regional tourism districts had a decrease in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2014 and FY 2013.

The table *Rhode Island 5.0% State Hotel Tax Allocation to Municipalities: Fiscal Year-to-Date Collections* shows the portion of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax distributed to the cities and towns in Rhode Island. In FY 2014, Newport received the largest portion of the municipalities' share of the revenue generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at \$1.02 million, an increase of \$32,007 or 3.2 percent more than the \$987,976 received in FY 2013. Providence received the second largest portion of the municipalities' share of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax in FY 2014 at \$789,101, an increase of \$49,201 or 6.6 percent more than the \$739,900 received in FY 2013. Warwick received the third largest portion of the

municipalities' share of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax in FY 2014 at \$541,171, an increase of \$21,090 or 4.1 percent more than the \$520,081 received in FY 2013.

The five municipalities with the largest percentage increase in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2014 and FY 2013 were: Foster, 171.6 percent; East Greenwich, 61.8 percent; Scituate, 41.2 percent; Glocester, 40.7 percent; and Portsmouth, 24.6 percent. The five municipalities with the largest percentage decrease in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2014 and FY 2013 were: Little Compton, -59.0 percent; Woonsocket, -18.7 percent; Richmond, -8.4 percent; North Smithfield, -6.9 percent; and Jamestown, -4.3 percent.

The five municipalities with the largest nominal increase in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2014 and FY 2013 were: Providence, \$49,201; Middletown, \$37,842; Newport, \$32,007; Westerly, \$30,522; and Warwick, \$21,090. The five municipalities with the largest nominal decrease in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2014 and FY 2013 were: Woonsocket, \$(6,322); Little Compton, \$(3,299); Jamestown, \$(216); Richmond, \$(167); and North Smithfield, \$(119).
