

State of Rhode Island Monthly State Hotel Report
FY 2015 State 5.0 Percent Hotel Tax Allocation December 2014

Beginning in June 2012, the Rhode Island Department of Revenue will issue a report on the allocation of the state 5.0 percent hotel tax as required by Rhode Island General Laws §§ 42-63.1-3 and 42-63.1-12. The report is meant to be descriptive and does not purport to project or assess the collection of the state 5.0 percent hotel tax. The report provides information on the year-over-year and fiscal year-to-date allocation of the revenues collected for the state 5.0 percent hotel tax.

SUMMARY OF THE STATE 5.0 PERCENT HOTEL TAX ALLOCATION

Analysis of Year-over-Year Allocation for December:

The following table is a summary of the year-over-year allocation of revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax.

The total revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax in December 2014 were \$747,514, an increase of \$63,513 or 9.3 percent over the \$684,001 received in December 2013. The largest share of these revenues is distributed to the State's eight regional tourism districts. In December 2014, the regional tourism districts received \$290,293 of the total revenues

Twenty-five percent of the revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax are distributed to the municipalities where the individual hotels are located. The City of Providence receives the same allocation from all of the hotels located in the city, except from the Omni Providence Hotel. In December 2014, the State's cities and towns received \$172,550, an increase of \$11,489 or 7.1 percent over the \$161,061 received in December 2013.

The Rhode Island Convention Center Authority (RICCA) receives 30.0 percent of the revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax at the Omni Providence Hotel. In December 2014, the RICCA received \$17,194, an increase of \$5,267 or 44.2 percent over the \$11,927 received in December 2013.

The State's share of the revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax is 21.0 percent, except from the Omni Providence Hotel where it is 27.0 percent. In December 2014, the State received \$160,417 from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax, an increase of \$14,391 or 9.9 percent over the \$146,026 received in December 2013. The State's share of the revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax is deposited into the miscellaneous departmental revenues component of departmental receipts.

The Providence Warwick Convention & Visitors Bureau (PWCVB) receives 23.0 percent of the revenues generated from the assessment of the state 5.0 percent hotel tax at hotels located in Providence and Warwick, 12.0 percent of the revenues generated from the assessment of the state 5.0 percent hotel tax at the Omni Providence Hotel, and 7.0 percent of the revenues generated from the assessment of the state 5.0 percent hotel tax at all other hotels located in the State. In December 2014, the PWCVB received \$107,060, an increase of \$12,846 or 13.6 percent over the \$94,214 received in December 2013.

Analysis of Fiscal Year-to-Date through December:

The following table is a summary of the fiscal year-to-date allocation of revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax.

The total revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax in FY 2015 through December were \$10.50 million, an increase of \$790,638 or 8.1 percent over the \$9.71 million received in FY 2014 through December. The largest share of these revenues is distributed to the State's eight regional tourism districts. In FY 2015 through December, the regional tourism districts received \$4.37 million of the total revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax, an increase of \$331,887 or 8.2 percent over the \$4.04 million received in the same period last fiscal year.

Twenty-five percent of the revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax are distributed to the municipalities where the individual hotels are located. The City of Providence receives the same allocation from all of the hotels located in the city, except from the Omni Providence Hotel. In FY 2015 through December, the State's cities and towns received \$2.49 million, an increase of \$193,056 or 8.4 percent over the \$2.30 million received in FY 2014 year-to-date.

The Rhode Island Convention Center Authority (RICCA) receives 30.0 percent of the revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax at the Omni Providence Hotel. In FY 2015 through December, the RICCA received \$161,316, an increase of \$5,524 or 3.5 percent over the \$155,792 received in FY 2014 year-to-date.

The State's share of the revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax is 21.0 percent, except from the Omni Providence Hotel where it is 27.0 percent. In FY 2015 through December, the State received \$2.24 million from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax, an increase of \$167,139 or 8.1 percent over the \$2.07 million received in FY 2014 year-to-date.

The Providence Warwick Convention & Visitors Bureau (PWCVB) receives 23.0 percent of the revenues generated from the assessment of the state 5.0 percent hotel tax at hotels located in Providence and Warwick, 12.0 percent of the revenues generated from the assessment of the state 5.0 percent hotel tax at the Omni Providence Hotel, and 7.0 percent of the revenues generated from the assessment of the state 5.0 percent hotel tax at all other hotels located in the State. In FY 2015 through December, the PWCVB received \$1.24 million, an increase of \$93,032 or 8.1 percent over the \$1.15 million received in FY 2014 year-to-date.

DETAIL OF THE STATE 5.0 PERCENT HOTEL TAX ALLOCATION

Analysis of Year-over-Year Allocation for December:

The table *Detail of Rhode Island State 5.0% Hotel Tax Allocation: Year-over-Year Collections* provides a breakdown of the distribution of the revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax on a year-over-year basis. The State's eight regional tourism districts include: (1) Aquidneck Island Tourism District¹; (2) Block Island; (3) the Convention Authority of the City of Providence; (4) East Providence²; (5) Northern Rhode Island Tourism District³; (6) South County Tourism District⁴; (7) the Statewide Tourism District⁵; and (8) the Warwick Department of Economic Development. The regional tourism districts are administered by either a regional council, a municipal government entity, or, as in the case of the Statewide Tourism District, the Rhode Island Commerce Corporation.

In general, the regional tourism districts receive 47.0 percent of the revenues generated from the application of the state 5.0 percent hotel tax at hotels located in the district. The exceptions to this allocation are the Convention Authority of the City of Providence, which receives 31.0 percent of the state 5.0 percent hotel tax revenues generated from all of the hotels situated in Providence including the Omni Providence Hotel, and the Warwick Department of Economic Development, which receives 31.0 percent of the state 5.0 percent hotel tax revenues generated from all of the hotels located in Warwick.

In December 2014, the Aquidneck Island Tourism District received the largest portion of the tourism districts' share at \$106,815, a decrease of \$1,546 or -1.4 percent over the \$108,361 received in December 2013. The Convention Authority of the City of Providence was the second largest recipient in December 2014 at \$79,297, an increase of \$16,639 or 26.6 percent over the \$62,658 received in December 2013. The Warwick Department of Economic Development was the third largest recipient in December 2014 at \$38,965, an increase of \$3,378 or 9.5 percent over the \$35,588 received in December 2013.

The three regional tourism districts with the largest percentage increase in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax between December 2014 and December 2013 were: South County, 43.8 percent; East Providence, 35.3 percent; and the Convention Authority of the City of Providence, 26.6 percent. The two regional tourism districts with a percentage decrease in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax between December 2014 and December 2013 were: Block Island, -88.8 percent and Aquidneck Island, -1.4 percent.

The three regional tourism districts with the largest nominal increase in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax between December 2014 and December 2013 were: the Convention Authority of the City of Providence, \$16,639; South County, \$10,426; and the Warwick Department of Economic Development, \$3,378. The two regional tourism districts with a nominal decrease in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax between December 2014 and December 2013 were: Block Island at \$(11,499) and Aquidneck Island, \$(1,546).

The table *Rhode Island State 5.0% Hotel Tax Allocation to Municipalities: Year-over-Year Collections* shows the portion of revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax distributed to the cities and towns in Rhode Island. In December 2014, Providence received the largest portion of the municipalities' share of the revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax at \$49,621, an increase of \$9,030 or 22.2 percent over the \$40,591 received in December 2013. Newport received the second largest portion of the municipalities' share of the state 5.0 percent hotel tax in December 2014 at \$44,670, a decrease of \$2,464 or -5.2 percent over the \$47,134 received in December 2013. Warwick received the third largest portion of the municipalities' share of the state 5.0 percent hotel tax in December 2014 at \$31,424, an increase of \$2,724 or 9.5 percent over the \$28,700 received in December 2013.

The five municipalities with the largest percentage increase in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax between December 2014 and December 2013 were: North Kingstown, 1,269.0 percent; Westerly, 52.8 percent; Portsmouth, 38.1 percent; East Providence, 35.3

percent; and West Greenwich, 29.6 percent. The five municipalities with the largest percentage decrease in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax between December 2014 and December 2013 were: New Shoreham, -88.8 percent; East Greenwich, -80.5 percent; Glocester, -42.0 percent; Scituate, -15.6 percent; and Narragansett, -14.8 percent.

The five municipalities with the largest nominal increase in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax between December 2014 and December 2013 were: Providence, \$9,030; Warwick, \$2,724; Westerly, \$2,342; North Kingstown, \$1,899; and Middletown, \$1,689. The five municipalities with the largest nominal decrease in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax between December 2014 and December 2013 were: New Shoreham, \$(6,116); Newport, \$(2,464); Woonsocket, \$(192); Bristol, \$(96); and Narragansett, \$(78).

Analysis of Fiscal Year-to-Date through December:

The table *Detail of Rhode Island State 5.0% Hotel Tax Allocation: Fiscal Year-to-Date Collections* provides a breakdown of the distribution of the revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax on a fiscal year-to-date basis. In FY 2015 through December, the Aquidneck Island Tourism District received the largest portion of the tourism districts' share at \$2.07 million, an increase of \$170,091 or 8.9 percent over the \$1.90 million received in FY 2014 through December. The Convention Authority of the City of Providence was the second largest recipient in FY 2015 year-to-date at \$711,925, an increase of \$44,761 or 6.7 percent over the \$667,164 received in FY 2014 year-to-date. The South County Tourism District was the third largest recipient in FY 2015 year-to-date at \$692,043, an increase of \$75,699 or 12.3 percent over the \$616,344 received in FY 2014 year-to-date.

The three regional tourism districts with the largest percentage increase in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax between FY 2015 through December and FY 2014 through December were: East Providence, 14.9 percent; South County, 12.3 percent; and the statewide district, 10.5 percent. The only regional tourism district with a percentage decrease in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax between FY 2015 through December and FY 2014 through December was Block Island at -3.0 percent.

The three regional tourism districts with the largest nominal increase in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax between FY 2015 through December and FY 2014 through December were: Aquidneck Island, \$170,091; South County, \$75,699; and the Convention Authority of the City of Providence, \$44,761. The only regional tourism district with a nominal decrease in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax between FY 2015 through December and FY 2014 through December was Block Island at \$(6,849).

The table *Rhode Island State 5.0% Hotel Tax Allocation to Municipalities: Fiscal Year-to-Date Collections* shows the portion of revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax distributed to the cities and towns in Rhode Island. In FY 2015 through December, Newport received the largest portion of the municipalities' share of the revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax at \$815,161, an increase of \$60,483 or 8.0 percent over the \$754,678 received in FY 2014 through December. Providence received the second largest portion of the municipalities' share of the state 5.0 percent hotel tax in FY 2015 year-to-date at \$439,703, an

increase of \$31,494 or 7.7 percent over the \$408,209 received in FY 2014 year-to-date. Warwick received the third largest portion of the municipalities' share of the state 5.0 percent hotel tax in FY 2015 year-to-date at \$307,973, an increase of \$25,954 or 9.2 percent over the \$282,019 received in FY 2014 year-to-date.

The five municipalities with the largest percentage increase in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax between FY 2015 through December and FY 2014 through December were: Foster, 115.0 percent; Portsmouth, 45.9 percent; Jamestown, 31.5 percent; Johnston, 30.2 percent; and Scituate, 28.1 percent. The five municipalities with the largest percentage decrease in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax between FY 2015 through December and FY 2014 through December were: Little Compton, -92.1 percent; East Greenwich, -34.1 percent; Glocester, -26.8 percent; Cranston, -11.6 percent; and West Greenwich, -7.4 percent.

The five municipalities with the largest nominal increase in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax between FY 2015 through December and FY 2014 through December were: Newport, \$60,483; Providence, \$31,494; Westerly, \$31,490; Middletown, \$28,650; and Warwick, \$25,954. The five municipalities with the largest nominal decrease in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax between FY 2015 through December and FY 2014 through December were: New Shoreham, \$(3,643); Little Compton, \$(2,025); West Greenwich, \$(1,996); Charlestown, \$(590); and Cranston, \$(336).
